## The context

- The wheat research community is facing societal challenges...
  - Wheat is the most widely grown crop in the world and provides 20% of the daily protein and food calories in the human diet.
  - Wheat is the 2<sup>nd</sup> most important food crop in the developing world after rice.
  - With a predicted world population of 9 billion in 2050, the demand for wheat is expected to increase by 60% compared with 2010
  - To meet this demand, mean annual yield increases must rise from the current level of 1% (2001-2010) to 1.6% (2011-2050)
  - How do we produce more wheat with less (land, water, pesticides, energy, man power, etc.)?
- Associated with technical challenges
  - How do we integrate very different types of data (for instance genetic, genomic, phenotypic data but also genetic resources data, environment data...) to allow meta-analysis such as the understanding of the interaction of plants with the environment and the cropping systems, given that:
    - A variety of new technologies are producing an important amont of heterogeneous data
    - Wheat related information and data systems are diverse

## The WDI working group in brief

- Endorsed by the Research Data Alliance (RDA) in March 2014
- The objective: contribute to the improvement of Wheat related data interoperability by
  - Build and promote a common interoperability framework (metadata, data formats and vocabularies)
  - Provide guidelines for describing, representing and linking Wheat related data
- Strategy: reuse existing assets as much as possible and build with the community

# **Target users**

| Target users                         | Expected benefits   |
|--------------------------------------|---|
| Data managers and curators           | Describe, represent and annotate data in a standardized way             |
| Integrated Wheat information systems | Easily capture data from different data sources                         |
| Computation and modelling tools      | Easily interprate, aggregate, analyse, etc. data from different sources |



# The strategy of the wg

- Identity existing assets that can be recommended as standards and promote interoperability mecanisms
  - Standardization takes time
  - It also takes time to get existing systems to conform to new standards
  - There are many uses cases
  - Even standards evolve

#### **Current achievements**

- Recommendations and guidelines (<a href="http://ist.blogs.inra.fr/wdi/">http://ist.blogs.inra.fr/wdi/</a>)
  - a set of rationalized recommendations regarding the data formats or metadata standards to describe, represent and share different types of wheat data
  - good practices regarding wheat data and metadata annotation (which controlled vocabularies), tools, etc.
- A portal of wheat related ontologies and vocabularies
  - Part of Agroportal, an ontology/vocabulary portal dedicated to plant, agronomic and environment sciences.
  - Allows the access to the ontologies and vocabularies through APIs.
  - Additional functions: mappings, text annotation, ontology recommender
- A prototype (semantic Web warehouse)
  - Implements real use cases of wheat data integration
    - Example: identification of wheat genes that control root growth

# **Perspectives**

- Extend the guidelines to more data types
- Beyond wheat
  - Many initiatives and projects on Plant and crop data management and sharing: crop ontology, planteome, copo (Collaborative Open Plant Omics), Wheat Information System, Agroportal, etc.
  - Semantics represent one of the cornerstones of good data management and sharing
  - How do we coordinate the ongoing efforts to be more efficient and avoid flooding the end user?
